In England, my love of horses and my riding skills won the admiration of the local British aristocracy who invited me to take part in polo matches and cross-country riding events. When I returned to India to join the Indian Military Academy, my dreams came true when I was posted to the Deccan Horse cavalry regiment.

As I grew older, I started playing Golf and till today it remains my passion. It gives me a sense of immense

satisfaction that the DLF Golf & Country Club which I developed in Gurgaon attracts some of the best golfers from India and abroad.

The reason why I am talking so much about my love of sports and outdoor activity is that just being here today in this magnificent school with such talented young men on the threshold of life brings back a flood of my own memories.

But the message I want to share with all of you is that Mayo has given you the best of basic education as well as opportunities to excel in outdoor activities. Make the best of it.

Your life lies ahead of you and it is up to you harness all that you have learnt to good use. The reality is that modern India needs young men like you to shape the future. The country needs well-educated youth with all-round skills to emerge as leaders in various fields.

There is no better way of serving your country than to set your sights on building successful careers and leading happy lives as individuals and as good human beings and responsible citizens.
